About This Center

The Minneapolis-St. Paul ELS Center is in the second-largest metro area in the Midwest. Students study in the vibrant Minneapolis downtown, at the top-tier University of St. Thomas. The classrooms are a short walk away from world-class entertainment and the offices of many Fortune 500 companies. Students can eat at cafeterias or walk out the door and choose from restaurants representing all cultures of the world.

Across the Mississippi River, students can enjoy the amenities of St. Thomas's eastern campus in the city of St. Paul. At the NCAA DI university, students can cheer for the "Tommies" at one of the men's or women's sporting events such as soccer, hockey, American football, or track and field. For convenience of the ELS students, a free shuttle bus connects the two campuses, while a thriving Metro Transit system can bring students anywhere.



About the Host University





University of St. Thomas

University of St. Thomas – Minnesota a is a private Catholic university spread across the two major cities in Minnesota: Minneapolis and St. Paul. Most of the 9,000 students study and live in the dorms at the St. Paul campus, while the business, education, and law students commute to Minneapolis campus for classes. ELS students experience the benefits of a bustling downtown setting on the Minneapolis campus, with a cafeteria and state-of-the-art classrooms. Before or after classes, ELS students have access to all the amenities of one of the top athletic programs in the Midwest: pools, gymnasiums, running tracks, large libraries, food venues, art galleries, and a massive new student center. The university offers more than 150 undergraduate degrees, 21 NCAA Division I sports teams, and nearly 150 clubs open to join. A free shuttle bus runs a short trip between the two campuses (10-15 minutes). After completing level 112 at the ELS Center, students can enter an undergraduate or master's program without the need for an official English score (from tests such as IELTS).



About the City and Region – Minnesota's Twin Cities: Minneapolis and St. Paul



Because of their proximity and similar population sizes, Minneapolis and St. Paul are often called the "Twin Cities." Both developed as major industry sites along the Mississippi River in the 1800s. The region is the ancestorial homelands of the Dakota and the Ojibwa peoples, and their indigenous cultures are present throughout the region in art and language. St. Paul became the capital city of Minnesota. Minneapolis because the commercial center and grew to be the largest city in the state. With a metro population over 3 million, the Twin Cities are the center of the state of Minnesota's commercial, industrial, educational, and cultural heritage. They also serve as a hub for international travel. Residents frequent the vibrant neighborhoods and restaurants before visiting one of many major museums, such as the Minneapolis Institute of Art (MIA) and its 90,000 works, or the Walker and its outdoor sculpture garden, or the Frank Gehry-designed Weisman Art Museum. Outdoor activities are everywhere, as bike and running paths connect to every location. People kayak and canoe the river and the famous Chain of Lakes. The Twin Cities also hosts seven professional sports teams, each of which plays in acclaimed stadiums, such as the 60,000-seat US Bank Stadium, which hosts the local NFL team, the Minnesota Vikings. Many people also take trips "up North" to experience the port city of Duluth that sits on the shores of the largest freshwater lake in the world: Lake Superior.

- Shopping centers, such as The Mall of America (the largest retail building in the U.S.), The Galleria in Edina, and Eagan Outlet Stores.

Local Transportation

- The Twin Cities are connected by Metro Transit, a public transportation system of rapid bus lines, light rail, and commuter busses. Students can purchase reduced rate passes from the University of St. Thomas. The region is also well known as having the strongest bicycle-commuting populations of any city in the nation, and students can easily zip from the Minneapolis campus to the St. Paul campus on the River Road in about 30 minutes.
- Minneapolis-St. Paul ELS students receive a University of St. Thomas student identification card which
 grants access to a free shuttle bus between the Minneapolis campus and the St Paul campus. The bus
 runs every 20 minutes throughout the day.

Homestay



- Room Type: Single occupancy
- Meals: 14 meals per week (Breakfast and Dinner)
- Distance from homestay to ELS Center: Most host families are within a 15-minute drive from the Center;
 no host family will be more than a one-hour drive
- Minimum Age: 16

Students who chose to live with host families will look forward to eating dinner and conversing together in the evening, celebrating holidays and special moments with them, and having ample opportunity to practice speaking English every day. Host families assist students in finding their way to the Center on the first day and teach them how to use public transit, if desired. Students who choose to live with host families have the best opportunities to learn about American culture and practices.

Check-in Time

Students will receive the name and address of the host family before they arrive.

Check-out Time

12:00 p.m. - 11:00 p.m. Sunday before session start date

Students will clean their living areas and return house keys directly to the host family.

ELS Core Classes

Structure and Speaking Practice (SSP)

SSP classes focus on speaking, listening and structure (grammar). Every student in Levels 101-109 takes SSP.

Language Technology Center (LTC)

In the LTC, students study on computers at their own pace with the help of the LTC instructor. LTC supports what students are learning in other classes and can be especially helpful in improving listening comprehension, grammar, vocabulary, and pronunciation.

Skills Enhancement

These classes focus on a variety of language skills and cover a range of topics to help students improve specific areas of language development. Examples of Skills Enhancement Classes include Pronunciation, Vocabulary Development, Idioms, Conversation and more.

Language Studies (LS)

This class focuses on listening, speaking and critical thinking skills. Every student in Levels 110-112 takes LS.

Reading and Writing (RW)

This class focuses on improving reading and writing All Intensive English students take two periods of Reading and Writing in the afternoon, Monday-Thursday.

Programs - Intensive English Program [REG]

- 30 Lessons/week (25 Hours/week)

Intensive English is our most comprehensive program, providing the highest level of proficiency for language learning. The curriculum is designed help students succeed by focusing on all elements of the language: listening, speaking, reading, writing, pronunciation, grammar, and vocabulary. Most students taking this program study with a plan to go to community college or university after completing ELS.

You must take this program to get the ELS level certificate required by the university.

Programs - Semi-Intensive English Program [SEM]

- 20 Lessons/week (16.7 Hours/week)

The Semi-Intensive English program allows students to learn English and get a true cultural experience at the same time. These classes are typically scheduled during morning hours and focus on all aspects of language and communication learning, including listening, vocabulary, grammar, and pronunciation. The classes are structured to provide speaking practice and tailored for real-world applications to give you the confidence to use your learning in social settings and in interactions with other students.

Programs - American Explorer Program (ACP)

* This program is not available to F-1 students.

- 15 Lessons/week (12.5 Hours/week)

Students who wish to study English while on vacation in the USA may do so in the ELS American Explorer program. This program features three morning lessons per day (Monday-Friday) for a total of 15 lessons per week. Afternoons are free for recreation and relaxation.

The American Explorer part-time program is cultural in nature and does not award certificates of language proficiency. Since the core class schedule may vary by Center and session, 15-hour students may have different programs at different Centers or in different sessions. The American Explorer program consists of 12 levels of instruction from Beginner to Masters, with four weeks of instruction per level.
